Tree Mortality Crisis: Here's How to Help

From 2019-2022, Lake County saw exponential growth in conifer tree mortality, with the estimated number of dead trees growing from 3,000 to 590,000. Amidst Lake County's escalating Tree Mortality Crisis, fueled by factors like extreme drought and bark beetle infestations, the urgent emphasis on the Right of Entry (ROE) permit process shines as a beacon of hope. With dead and dying trees posing substantial risks to public safety and fueling wildfire hazards, community involvement in the ROE process (beginning in portions of Districts 1 and 5) is a vital solution. If you receive an ROE permit in the mail or are interested in participating in the program, please complete a ROE permit. Read More
